

## TREE REMOVAL Information Sheet No. tp 8 – Trees and Boundaries

| THE NEIGHBOUR'S TREE<br>BRANCHES ARE OVERHANGING<br>AND ROOTS ARE INVADING MY<br>PROPERTY. CAN I PRUNE THEM?  | Yes, however it is advisable to speak to your neighbours and reach an agreement before undertaking any pruning.<br>Pruning should only be done to the minimum extent necessary (up to your property boundary) and in accordance with the <i>Australian Standard for Pruning of Amenity Trees (see AS4373-2007)</i> *. Pruning must not result in a detrimental impact to the future health or stability of the tree or compromise the form of the tree.  |
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| WHAT SHOULD I DO WITH THE PRUNINGS?   | Any roots, fruit, branches you remove from your neighbour's tree remain your neighbour's property. Legally you should return them. Do not throw such things back over the fence; they should be placed neatly on an agreed site to stop any ill feeling.   |
| WHAT IF I HAVE DIFFICULTY WITH<br>MY NEIGHBOURS OVER<br>DISCUSSIONS ABOUT THEIR<br>TREES AND WOULD LIKE TO<br>PRUNE OR REMOVE A TREE ON AN<br>ADJOINING PROPERTY WHICH HAS<br>CAUSED OR IS LIKELY TO CAUSE<br>DAMAGE TO PROPERTY OR<br>INJURY TO PERSONS ON MY<br>LAND? | Legal advice should be sought regarding liability for damage caused by the tree/s or cost of maintenance to the trees. Tree disputes between neighbours are a civil matter.<br>Conflicts may be resolved through the Community Justice Centre on phone number 1800 990 777. Further advice can be obtained from LawAccess NSW, a free government telephone service that provides legal information advice and referrals for people who have a legal problem in NSW. Call LawAccess NSW on 1300 888 529 between 9am and 5 pm, Monday to Friday (excluding public holidays).<br>If the neighbour is unco-operative then if your land is within a zone designated "residential" (but not rural-residential), "village", "industrial" or "business" you may wish to apply to the Land and Environment Court to seek resolution under the <i>Trees (Disputes Between Neighbours) Act 2006</i> .
